Guidelines for Writing Good Eval Questions:

- The **purpose** of eval questions is to gain informative feedback that you would not otherwise gain from the standard student eval, to measure a specific change you have implemented in your course, or to gain course-specific feedback on a learning tool, an instructional method, an inclusive pedagogy, or a method of inquiry or engagement.
- Create questions that are clear and focused in purpose.
 - Guide students to the specific type of feedback you are looking for.
 - Students tend to provide better feedback to more specific questions. Asking about a specific type of activity, or asking students to share the most important point they learned during the semester, may provide more useful feedback.
 - Example: instead of asking “How useful were the instructional materials and activities for this course?”, focus on a specific material or activity.
- Avoid leading questions.
 - Yes/no questions can often be leading questions. Instead of asking “Did you learn a great amount from this course?”, a better question would be “To what extent do you feel you mastered the content in this course?”

Examples of Good Eval Questions:

- What are one to three specific things about (name specific learning tool) that helped to support your learning in this course?
- What parts of the course aided your learning the most (i.e. the weekly quizzes, the short papers, the group work, the essays, etc.)?
- What are one to three specific things about the course that could be improved to better support your learning?
- What is one take away from this course that you would like to pass on to future students enrolled in this course?
- In what way did the Christian Practice / Reflection help you this semester?
